American Art Books Donated to BPL



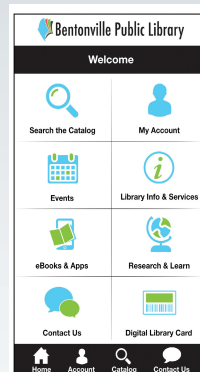

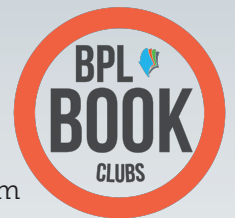

Can the City clean my ditch?

Sometimes the city receives requests to clean out overgrown ditches or drainage ways. However, in most cases, property owners are responsible for keeping drainage ditches free and clear of debris.

City Code 2006-167 Article 200 C.1 and C.8 cover drainage system maintenance. The owner of any private drainage system shall maintain the system to prevent or reduce the discharge of pollutants. This maintenance shall include, but is not limited to, sediment removal, bank erosion repairs, maintenance of vegetative cover, and removal of debris from pipes and structures.

Every person owning or occupying property through which an open drainage channel passes shall keep and maintain that part of the drainage channel within the property free of trash, debris, excessive vegetation, and other obstacles that would pollute, contaminate, or retard the flow of water through the drainage channel.

Erosion is a natural process which causes blockages. If the ditches and drainage ways are not maintained on a regular basis, the repairs will become more difficult and expensive. In some cases, the maintenance can be physically demanding or require specialized equipment.

Town Vu Bridge: Replaced the current one-lane bridge on Town Vu Rd. with a box culvert that allows for two-lanes of traffic.

NW 3rd / Walton: Installing a traffic signal that includes protected left turn movements for NW 3rd St. traffic.

SW I / SW 14th: Constructing an additional southbound lane on SW I St. from Melissa Dr. to SW 14th St. (Hwy 102).

I-49 / S Walton (Exit 85): ARDOT is constructing a Single Point Urban Interchange (SPUI).

I-49/N Walton (Exit 93): ARDOT has removed the roundabout and is constructing a Single Point Urban Interchange (SPUI).

In the Works

Water Tower / SE 8th, Phase I: Extending SE 8th St. east to Water Tower Rd. Currently acquiring right-of-way and completing design. Construction bid expected this year.

Water Tower / SE 8th, Phase II: Widening Water Tower Rd. south to SE 14th St. Currently acquiring right-of-way, completing design, and starting utility relocation.

S Main, Phase I SE 2nd to SE 8th: Currently designing to narrow travel lanes and add landscaping and wider sidewalks.

SE / SW 8th Widening: Currently re-designing to widen 8th St. from SW I St. to Moberly Ln. to add bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

Town Vu Bridge to SW I: Currently designing a continuous bicycle route from the west city limits on Town Vu Rd. connecting to SW 8th St.

NW 3rd, Elm Tree to N Walton: Currently designing a continuous bicycle and pedestrian route connecting Apple Gate Trail and N. Walton Trail.

N Walton / Tiger Intersection: Constructing left turn lanes at NW 12th St. and Tiger Blvd. and replacing the signal.

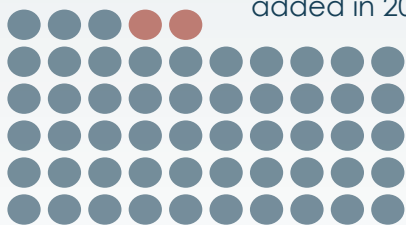

Development Code Changes

In 2020, City Council approved nine code amendments. Two of those were major updates to the Zoning Code and Land Development Code. The remaining seven were related to specific issues, including noise, group homes, detention ponds, accessory structures, performance bonds, run-off mitigation, and outdoor dining in public parking spaces during the pandemic. *More info:* <http://www.bentonvillear.com/198/Code-Amendments>

By the Numbers: 2020 Development Activity

The projects submitted to the Current Planning division serve as an indicator for future construction levels. Based on the number of projects submitted, construction levels are likely to be at an all-time high in 2021.

The Planning Department processed 364 projects, up 46% from 2019. This is the highest number of items coming through the department in ten years. Nearly 42% of all items are zoning related and the remaining 58% are development items.

2020 Record Year for Art Installations



The Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC) had an active year installing and selecting artwork. A temporary piece titled *Universal Inseparability* by Ben Pierce, approved in 2019, was installed at the corner of Tiger Blvd and NW A Street in Spring of 2020. *Open Heart* by Matthew Duffy was placed in the roundabout at Bright Road and Gator Boulevard in June.

During the summer, the committee issued a Call for NWA Artists to support the local art community during the COVID-19 pandemic. They selected two pieces totaling \$14,050. The first is a permanent sculpture and landscape display titled *The Almost Forgotten Osage Prairie* by Jonathan Perrodin installed at Lake Bentonville Park. The second is a temporary fabric and poem piece titled *Guide, these, my hands* by Danielle Hatch and Traci Rae Manos to be installed in Train Station Park this Spring.

They also approved several proposals from outside organizations, including *Flight* by Bob Doster at Lake Bentonville Park, *ArtFeeds Sunshine School Mural* at Citizens Park, and *Box Turtle* by Stephen Feilbach on the All-American Trail.

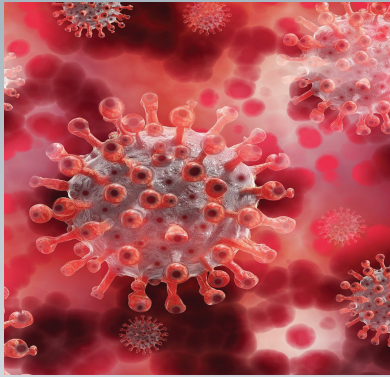

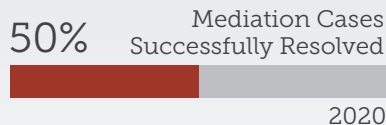
Small Claims Mediation

Bentonville District Court has kicked off the fourth year of their Small Claims mediation program. The program is available in part, thanks to a grant from the Arkansas Alternative Dispute Resolution Commission in Little Rock. The program offers Small Claims Plaintiffs and Defendants an opportunity to creatively find a resolution with a trained mediator – all for free.

If a resolution cannot be met, both parties have the chance to have their case heard before Judge Ray Bunch in the courtroom. Several local attorneys offer their services and experiences, helping others to find ways to bridge the gap outside the courtroom. The program offers a wide range of solutions, which can ultimately result in a legally-binding agreement.

The program gives litigants and the court another tool for resolving disputes. Mediation also allows for alternative solutions not often available in traditional court environments, such as creative payment arrangements and mediated settlement agreements which, if followed through by the parties, leaves no judgment of record against the defendant.

Spring Fire Safety

Dryers

- Clean out the vent pipe each year.



Grilling

- Make sure the grill is properly cleaned. 20% of all grill structure fires are due to grills not being properly cleaned.



Outdoor fire pits & chimneys

- Never leave young children unattended by a fire pit.
- Keep an extinguishing source nearby, such as a fire extinguisher, water hose, or bucket of water.
- Have your chimney inspected once per year. Now is a good time to do this.

Smoke alarms

- Change batteries in the spring when the time changes.
- Test them once a month.

Contact Republic Services to schedule a large item pick up at 855-4226. They will collect up to one large item per week, but remember to call before you put the item out.

Trash Can Placement

Place trash cans on driveway or grass. Don't place them in the street where they can impede traffic or block sidewalks.

Recycling Best Practice

If you can poke your finger through it, don't recycle. The plastic is too soft and flimsy to be recycled. It would get tangled in the sorting machinery and jam up the operation.
