Road Projects Under Construction

I-49 / S Walton (Exit 85): ARDOT is constructing a Single Point Urban Interchange (SPUI).

S Main, SE 2nd to SE 8th: Project includes a road diet to narrow lanes and construct wider sidewalks.

Water Tower / SE 8th, Ph I: Extending SE 8th St. from I-49 east to Water Tower Rd.

SW Bright: This section of street, constructed in conjunction with Parks and Recreation's Creekside Park, will extend Bright Rd. north beyond SW Airport Rd. to SW 28th St.

N Walton / NW 12 / Tiger Intersection: Constructing left turn lanes at NW 12th St. and Tiger Blvd. and replacing signals.

NE Cub Sidewalk: This project consists of the installation of approximately 550 linear feet of concrete sidewalk along Cub Cir. from Tiger Blvd. to NE A St. to make a connection to the Razorback Greenway.

When Do I Need a Right-of-Way Permit?

ROW permits are required at all times during any work upon, in, under, above or about any street, alley, curb, gutter, sidewalk, driveway, or any public right-of-way. For details, scan QR Code or visit <https://www.bentonvillear.com/762/Right-of-Way-Permit>.



Right-of-Way Elements:

Vehicle travel lanes, turn lanes, medians, traffic signals and signs, roundabouts, and on-street parking areas.

Public transportation stops and shelters.

Bicycle and pedestrian multiuse trails, sidewalks, bike lanes, street landscaping, seating, lighting, and other streetscape elements.

ARTERIAL STREETS: Utilized for travel through the city and provide connections to other cities and highways; linking major commercial, residential, and industrial uses.



COLLECTOR STREETS: Intended to collect traffic from Local Streets and connect them to Arterial Streets; usually those travelling to or from a nearby location.



LOCAL or RESIDENTIAL STREETS: Primarily accessed only by people who live in the area. These streets are low-capacity and have a low speed limit.
Example: Fir St.



DOWNTOWN STREETS: Found in the downtown core of the city; designed to allow users increased walkability and to access businesses in the core area.
Example: NW 2nd St.

Great Neighborhoods Partnership



Development by the Numbers

2022 first quarter permit data suggests higher growth than in 2021. The total number of building permits issued in the first quarter of 2022 is nearly 20% higher than the first quarter of 2021. The number of houses started is double that of 2021 and the number of multifamily units started is three-times that of 2021.




Arts in the Parks

SUMMER Safety Tips



Build campfires at least 25 feet away from tents, shrubs and anything that can burn.



If you want to see fireworks, go to a public show put on by experts. Sparklers can reach 1,200* F and cause third-degree burns.




Always use U.S. Coast Guard-approved life safety jackets.



Always wear a bike helmet and bright clothes when cycling so people can see you. Put reflectors on your bike.




Use chimineas, outdoor fireplaces, and fire pits outdoors only and at least 10 feet away from your home or anything that can burn.



Use propane, charcoal and wood pellet barbecue grills outdoors only. Indoor use can cause a fire or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Place your grill well away from siding and deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Do not store or use a grill on a porch or balcony.



Ride with both hands on the handlebars. Ride in single file with traffic. Stop at all stop signs and obey traffic lights.



Never swim near a boat, marina or boat launching ramp.

FEMA Risk Rating 2.0: Equity in Action

FEMA Risk Rating 2.0 is the new National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) system that makes the most significant change in flood insurance risk rating in 40 years. All properties with flood insurance in Bentonville will see a change.

The flood insurance rate will no longer be based solely on Flood Insurance Rate Maps. It incorporates many federal sources of data, insurance data, and new technologies to create individual flood risk ratings that are more accurate and equitable. Every structure is rated on an individual cost to rebuild. The uninsured can consider asking an insurance company for a new NFIP flood insurance quote today.

If you want to know if your home is in a regulated flood zone or is in an area subject to drainage issues, enter concerns into the city's 311 system or call 479-271-3168 for the Floodplain Program.
