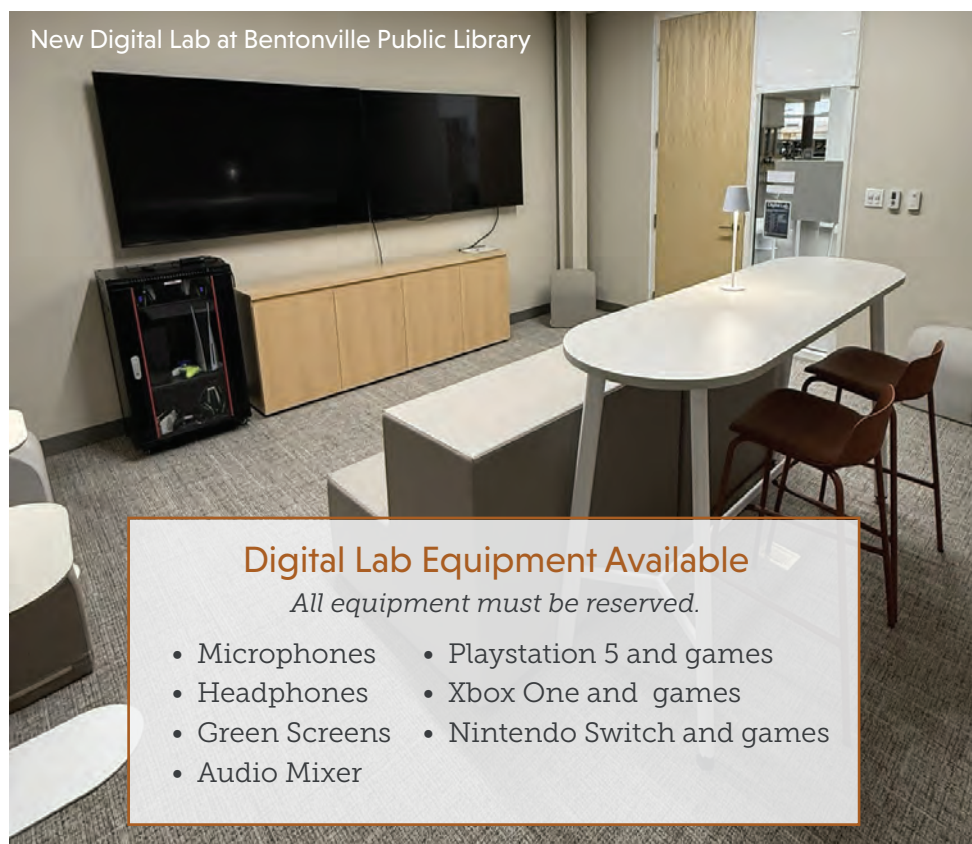

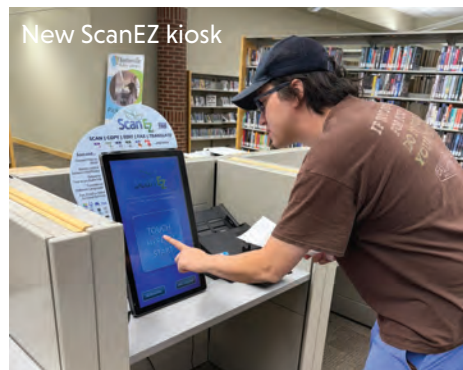
New Copy/Print/Fax/Scan Services

When we renovated our existing building, we set aside funding to upgrade and expand our Business Center that includes remote printing and expanded scanning services.

Print From Anywhere. Now you can use our online portal to print from home, your phone, or anywhere with a browser! Create a temporary username (it expires in 24 hours, so no stress on coming up with an epic username) and add your email address or phone number if you want to be notified. Then come to the Library, put your username into the payment kiosk, and select the items to print. Standard print fees apply.

Scan and So Much More!!! Our new ScanEZ kiosk is more than just a scan-and-print device. Patrons now have access to a versatile machine that can be used for personal, educational, and professional uses.

This new technology has a simple user experience, full-color previews, can convert to many different file formats, and comes with many accessibility and editing features. You can pay for prints with cash, card, and Apple Pay!

Street Projects Update

Completed:

SW 28th St.: SW 28th St. widened and extended from SW Featherston Rd. to SW I St. Improvements include a roundabout at SW Bright Rd. and facilities for pedestrians and bicycles.



Nearing Completion:

SE Walton Blvd. & Medical Center Pkwy.: Construction of north and south bound right-turn lanes and dual turn lanes onto SE Walton Blvd. from Medical Center Pkwy.

SE Walton Blvd. & SE J St.: Intersection improvements with dedicated additional turn lanes on SE J St. and a dedicated right-turn lane on SE Walton Blvd.

Getting Started:

Walton Blvd. & W Central Ave.: Intersection improvements include dual eastbound and westbound left-turn lanes, dedicated northbound and southbound right-turn lanes on Walton Blvd., and extending vehicle queue lengths.

Protect Your Water: Never Dump Down Stormwater Drains

Storm drains are a direct link to our local streams, rivers, lakes and wetlands. What goes into these drains directly affects water quality. The disposal, pouring or dumping of anything not composed entirely of stormwater into a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4), such as storm drains and ditches, is called an illicit discharge. To avoid illicit discharge, never dump anything in drains or ditches. Videos and more information available online at www.KnowtheFlowNWA.com.

Illicit Discharge Substances:

- Oil such as motor oil, cooking oil, and grease
- Paint and paint remover
- Pesticides
- Trash, yard waste, and fertilizers
- Pool chemicals
- Wash water stemming from car and power washing
- Construction material and concrete washout

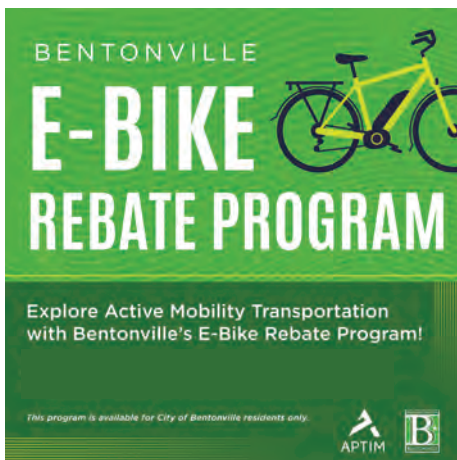

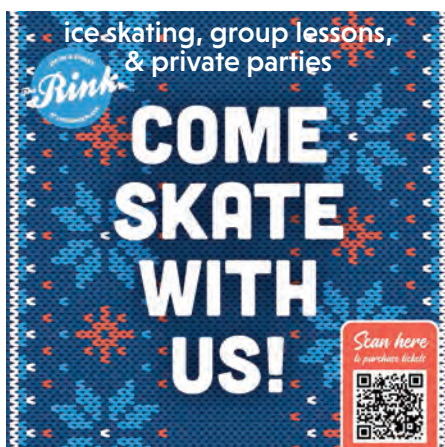
Bentonville E-Bike Rebate Program

City Supporting Local Businesses with Registry

Nearly two years ago, Bentonville launched the Business Registry and it has become a valuable tool for strengthening connections between the City and our thriving business community.

What We've Learned. While Bentonville is home to Walmart, nearly 80% of our local businesses are small, with less than 20 employees. The top industries, comprising over 50% of all registrations, are Other Services, Retail Trade, and Accommodation and Food Service.

How We're Helping. The registry provides a direct line of communication with Bentonville businesses. Registered businesses receive email updates and invitations to in-person events. Recent notifications included updates about the new Development Code, a link to a business survey, and invitation to our annual Business Link event.

What's Next. Now that the registry is well established, we're shifting gears to provide even more value to registered businesses with an exciting initiative: the "Buy Bentonville" campaign.

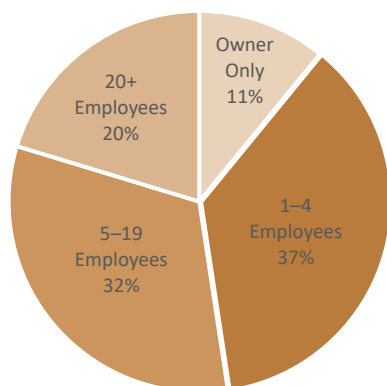
Just in time for the holidays, the City—along with local partners—will launch a campaign encouraging residents and visitors to shop, dine, and enjoy entertainment locally. As part of this effort, the online Business Registry List and Map will help the community discover and support Bentonville businesses. If you haven't registered, do so today to ensure your business is on the list and map.

Rules on Burning in Bentonville

The City of Bentonville reminds residents about Ordinance No. 2004-158, which regulates burning activities in Bentonville city limits.

Open burning of yard debris—such as leaves, limbs, or brush—is prohibited within city limits unless a properly issued burn permit has been obtained. Permits are only available for properties zoned Agricultural (A) or Residential Estate (R-E). Residents are encouraged to use alternative options such as composting or mulching. Also, Bentonville residents can drop-off grass, leaves, limbs, and brush at the Compost Facility, located at 2000 NW A Street.

These regulations are established to keep our community safe, our air clean, protect public health, reduce fire hazards, and encourage safe disposal methods for yard waste.

Seat Belt Safety Day is Nov. 14

Wearing your seat belt is one of the easiest ways to protect yourself on the road. Whether you're driving across town or just around the corner, always remember to buckle up. One click can save a life—make it a habit every trip, everytime.



Check candy:

- Before eating, check all treat wrappers for signs of tampering.
- Throw away anything unwrapped. If in doubt, throw it out.
- Discard items that can cause choking, such as hard candies and small toys.
- Beware of new types of high-caffeine candy.
- Report any harmful items to the Bentonville Police.

Drive cautiously:

- Drive slowly and remain cautious.
- Watch for children in the street and medians.
- Exit driveways and alleyways carefully, especially when in residential areas.
- Watch out for kids darting between homes or across roads.
- Encourage children to exit the car on the curb side.

Other Fire Safety Tips

- Teach your child how to dial 9-1-1 in an emergency.
- Demonstrate how to stop, drop, cover face, and roll if your clothes catch on fire.

- Change smoke alarm batteries when turning your clocks back an hour.

Curbside Leaf Collection Begins December 8

The City of Bentonville will begin its annual fall leaf curbside pickup on Monday, Dec. 8, 2025, and continue through Friday, Dec. 19, 2025.

Pickup must be scheduled by calling 479-254-2059 or emailing fallleaf-collection@bentonvillear.com. Bags will only be collected if scheduled.

This program is for bagged leaves only. Bags must be tied, placed at the curb or street edge, and kept out of ditches or areas that affect drainage. Property owners are responsible for leaf disposal outside of the program. For questions, contact Public Works Maintenance at 479-418-8688.

Leaves, grass, limbs, and brush may also be taken to the City's Compost Facility at 2000 NW A Street. The facility is open Monday–Saturday, 8 a.m. – 4 p.m., and requires a utility bill and photo ID. The Compost Facility will be closed Nov. 27–28 for Thanksgiving and back open Saturday, Nov. 29, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Flood Awareness: Safety, Permits & Preparedness



The City of Bentonville participates in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's National Flood Insurance Program and the Community Rating System. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has identified Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHA) on Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM) for the City of Bentonville.

A Floodplain Development Permit is required for any construction on properties located within a SFHA. It applies to all structural development, placement of manufactured structures, clearing, grading, mining, drilling, dredging, placement of fill, excavating, watercourse alteration, drainage improvements, roadway or bridge construction, individual water or sewer installations or any other development in a Special Flood Hazard Area. Participation in the Community Rating System (CRS) program mitigates home and business damage caused by flooding.

Leaf Collection Program Rules

- Schedule pickup by phone or email (not both).
- Only bagged leaves will be collected; no limbs, brush, grass, or trash.
- Bags must be owner-provided, securely tied, and placed within 10 ft. of curb, away from trash and ditches.
- Single-family and duplex properties only (no apartments or commercial).
- Bags not scheduled for pickup will not be collected.
- After scheduling, allow 24 to 48 hours for pickup.
