Letter from the Director

Hello Friends,

I am pleased to share that it was another successful year for Bentonville Parks and Recreation. While preparing the 2023 annual report, I had the distinct privilege of reflecting on the department's accomplishments to date and acknowledging the people and partners that made it possible.

Based on the explosive population increase in Northwest Arkansas, we outproduced expectations across the board. In 2023, an estimated six million people, including three million trail users, visited a public park in Bentonville. According to registration numbers, we had over 106,000 participants in adult sports, youth sports, and running events combined. At the Bentonville Community Center, membership exceeded 71,416 patrons. To stay relevant in their respective roles, several of our staff members attended conferences, completed management school, obtained certifications, and participated in educational classes from forklift to stormwater to American Red Cross Water Safety Instructor training.

As an active city, we continue to focus on the following priorities – groundbreaking designs, increased access and entertainment value, vibrant outdoor recreation space, inclusive environment, and cultural impact. Serving residents remains at the top of the list. Look to Creekside Park and the Wishing Spring Trail as perfect examples. These projects were specifically designed with a distinct purpose in mind, and both have exceeded the primary goal and expected use.

Thanks to the generous support from private partners, stakeholders, and the public at large, our community is leading the way in creating and maintaining open green spaces. With \$200 million worth of capital improvement projects in motion, the scale and scope of our work remains extensive. In simpler terms, there is a lot going on and a lot to do. Two of the bond projects passed by voters in 2021 are under way with major dirt work happening at Phillips Park and Phase 1 of the A Street Promenade (Quilt of Parks) under construction. Heading into 2024, there is considerable focus on different modes of transportation and shared use including an aggressive plan for developing 35 miles of bicycle infrastructure. It is indeed a time of transformation, and I am grateful our team will lay the groundwork and bring the community's vision to life.

Creekside Park

Creekside Park, roughly 35 acres in total, represents one of Bentonville's most innovative public parks, housing Northwest Arkansas' first regulation cricket field. Also located in the park are eight lighted pickleball courts, a destination splash pad, playground, shaded picnic pavilion with smaller shaded tables, a maintenance building, 1.6-mile bike trail (Little Osage Creek Trail) and Bentonville's first illuminated dog park. The on-site trail segment will eventually provide access as far south as the Bentonville Community Center and as far north as Osage Park, 8th Street Gateway Park and the Coler Mountain Bike Preserve – further expanding Bentonville's "grand loop" trail system.

The \$7.9 million project at Creekside Park was funded primarily through parks impact and capacity fees. The Walton Family Foundation contributed the balance of \$1.6 million for additional park amenities. Cynthia Coughlin generously donated the property. Ecological Design Group provided the park design and Flintco served as the contractor. Simultaneously, the City of Bentonville transportation department completed the extension of Bright Road, creating the first green street initiative in Bentonville. Collaboration was key in establishing connectivity and access for numerous subdivisions in proximity to the park.



Throughout new project development, Bentonville Parks and Recreation strives to offer accessible spaces and programming for all members of the community. A concrete example is the department's long-standing commitment to the NWA Cricket community. For over two decades, local cricket players used Phillips Park, a baseball complex, as their designated playing fields. Since 1998, the number of cricket teams expanded from two to thirty-two. Over 500+ players in the league respectively waited year after year to see their dream fulfilled. Creekside Park was intentionally designed with these dedicated players in mind.

The grand opening of Creekside Park on Saturday, June 17, included a public art unveiling of Upper Cut by New York artist Alvaro Bonfiglio. The installation consists of a 31-foot-long sustainable wood sculpture designed in the shape of an oversized cricket bat gripped by

magic gloves. The significance celebrates the history and heritage of residents from countries of origin where cricket is the most popular sport.

According to the census website, the current Bentonville population is close to 64,000. Based on data from the 2020 census, approximately 20% of the population is of Asian descent. Establishing a park in the southwest corridor of Bentonville was identified a top-tier priority in the Play Bentonville Master Plan prepared years ago. Building Creekside Park surpassed the objective by creating socialization and multipurpose space, incorporating shade, comfort, and architectural elements, implementing water sustainability measures, and meeting the interests of a growing and diverse population.



Wishing Spring Trail

Bentonville Parks and Recreation celebrated the grand re-opening of the Wishing Spring Trail with a ribbon-cutting event at the bridge on November 8. This portion of the Razorback Greenway is a highly traveled thoroughfare for more than 1,000 people per day, connecting residents and visitors from Bentonville to Bella Vista and all points north. The trail was disconnected during construction of the I-49 Bypass. An impressive bridge was installed, spanning a key section of Town Branch Creek, and reorienting the new hard surface trail in either direction. The much-anticipated trail renovation was completed thanks to funding

from the Arkansas Department of Transportation and the Walton Family Foundation. Trailblazers and CEI were instrumental in the project design. Both Milestone Construction and Bentonville Parks and Recreation handled the work. Bentonville Moves Coalition collaborated with local organizations and area businesses to organize a series of engaging activities leading up to and following the City celebration. As part of the festivities, Buddy Pegs, Gnargo Bikes, All Bodies on Bikes, and Women of Oz NWA hosted bike trains and group rides.





Slaughter Pen Skills Park

The skills park was a project that NWA Trailblazers presented to Bentonville Parks and Recreation. Its main function is to serve wheeled enthusiasts in a self-regulated environment that is safe and approachable for all ages and abilities. Although the skills park is only 40% complete, it has already made a big impact in our community of wheeled enthusiasts and continues to capture and attract visitors and locals alike who are looking for a safe place to do bike maneuvers. Future expansion will include additional features that are adjacent to the new skills area.





Park & Facility Renovations

Bark Park and NE A Street Restrooms

Restrooms at the Bark Park and NE A Street have undergone a recent upgrade with new epoxy flooring, enhancing aesthetics and functionality. The seamless and glossy epoxy surface ensures durability, easy maintenance, and resistance to stains, creating a more inviting and hygienic environment for visitors in these public spaces.



Tennis Court Resurfacing

Some of the tennis courts at Citizen's Park and Memorial Park have been recently resurfaced, revitalizing the playing surface for an enhanced sporting experience. This not only improves the overall appearance of the courts but also ensures a more responsive and safer playing environment. The project reflects a commitment to maintaining top-notch facilities, benefiting both recreational and competitive players who can now enjoy a renewed and improved tennis experience.



Parking Lot Revitalization at Memorial Park

Memorial Park's parking lots recently underwent resealing and striping for improved functionality and appearance. The resealing process, involving a protective layer, enhances durability against the elements. Fresh striping was added to clearly mark parking spaces, improving safety and organization. This initiative extends the parking lot's lifespan and boosts overall aesthetic appeal, creating a more organized and welcoming environment.

Public Art

Cozy Apple

Cozy Apple is a three-foot wide custom-shaped inflatable apple wrapped with handmade crocheted granny circles. Different shades of red acrylic yarn were used to crochet granny circles and then sewn together and wrapped around the inflatable apple.

The unique piece by artist Gina Gallina was designed to “roam” around the community as tribute to Bentonville’s rich apple history and community spirit. It was moved throughout the city with a goal of uniting our past and present in a celebration of creativity and heritage. Residents and visitors were encouraged to take photos by the Cozy Apple and upload them to a collective site.



Double Slit Skyline

Double Slit Skyline by Texas sculptor Dewane Hughes was installed Wednesday, May 17, 2023. The artwork is a steel sculpture approximately 16 feet tall by 5 feet wide. Hughes describes Double Slit Skyline as “a reference to the quantum mechanical double slit experiment that helped determine that outcome is based on perspective.” The artwork recreates that concept formally by framing two adjacent perspectives of the world around us. Double Slit Skyline will be on display for approximately one year.

Hughes is a Distinguished Professor of Sculpture at the University of Texas at Tyler. He has a Bachelor of Arts in Sculpture from Buena Vista University in Storm Lake, Iowa and a Master of Fine Arts in Sculpture from Montana State University in Bozeman, Montana. He was recently nominated for the International Sculpture Center’s Outstanding Educator Award.

Uppercut

Upper Cut by New York artist Alvaro Bonfiglio is being installed in June 2023 in the new Creekside Park at SW 28th Street and Bright Rd. This installation commemorates the first cricket pitch field in Arkansas and celebrates our local residents whose country of origin is one in which cricket is the most popular sport. The 31-foot-long sustainable wood sculpture is the shape of a gigantic cricket bat held by magic gloves that just hit an “upper cut.” The irregular wood cladding design represents the texture of the batting gloves and leg pads used in the sport.

Bonfiglio is a licensed architect, continuing adjunct professor and thesis adviser at New York University, and a managing member of Bonfiglio Construction, LLC. He has an architecture degree from Universidad de la Republica in Uruguay and a PhD in Engineering from The University of Tokyo in Japan. His past work includes numerous international publications, lectures, awards, travel grants, exhibitions, structural construction and art installations.

The piece was locally fabricated by Heritage Woodwork - Austin Vanderveer.

This artwork was selected from 12 submittals in response to a Request for Proposals. It is funded by the Parks and Recreation Department and Visit Bentonville.



Li'l Library

Bentonville Public Library is spreading their mission to promote literacy across Bentonville with Li'l Libraries. Lake Bentonville was chosen as the first installation site because many families go there to play, relax by the water, or look to the sky. Libraries promote the idea of sharing with an invitation to take a book or leave one to share with the community.

Lighting of the Square

In partnership with Downtown Bentonville Inc., the Bentonville Square transformed into a “winter wonderland” on Saturday, November 18, during the annual Lighting of the Square celebration. A highlight of the evening, and one of Bentonville’s most beloved seasonal traditions, is a “flip of the light switch” by Mayor Stephanie Orman, illuminating the Bentonville Square with over 30 miles of wrapped colorful lights. The Bentonville Parks and Recreation maintenance team works a total of 3,600 hours over a 10-week time period installing 410,000 individual lights bulbs. The result is pure magic that is enjoyed by thousands of residents and visitors during the holiday season.





Adaptive Sports

On Saturday, March 18, we had the privilege of hosting the Ozark Adaptive Sports Association (OZASA) at the Bentonville Community Center. They showcased adaptive equipment, creating possibilities for individuals with physical disabilities to engage in sports and maintain active lifestyles. OZASA is a nonprofit organization that shows individuals what is possible by getting them back on the move and physically active.





Camp Bentonville

A total of 2,410 campers participated in Camp Bentonville 2023. From Camp Lego to Camp Mountain Bike to Camp Volleyball to Camp Theatre, Bentonville Parks and Recreation offered something for everyone, hosting 120 different sessions throughout the spring, summer, and fall.







Run Bentonville Race Series

Square 2 Square



Square 2 Square Bike Rides are a yearly collaboration between Bentonville Parks and Recreation and Fayetteville Parks and Recreation, designed to celebrate the trail systems of Northwest Arkansas while benefiting the Greenway Alliance. This 2023 Square 2 Square hosted over **3,600 riders** across the spring and fall events between in person and virtual participants. The May Square 2 Square Bike Ride began in

Fayetteville and finished at Lawrence Plaza where riders were greeted with a finish line celebration and the vibrancy found around the Bentonville Square. For the October Square 2 Square Bike Ride, riders started in Bentonville at the beautiful Sam's Club Home Office before making the journey south to Fayetteville.




Parks maintenance maintains eleven (11) Eco Counter trail user counting systems strategically placed throughout the parks trail system. Data is collected by the counter and relayed via a cellular connection to the Eco Visio data management software platform which breaks down the trail use into a variety of categories including day, time, peak use, and in one installation the counter differentiates between pedestrian and bike. The counters do not fully cover all of the trails and subsequently the counts are a snapshot of trail use.


